## El verbo “gustar”

-To say that you like something in Spanish, use the verb \_\_\_\_\_ . However, the literal translation of gustar is “ \_\_\_\_\_ ”, **NOT** “to like”.

### MODELO:

How we would say it: \_\_\_\_\_

How it literally translates: \_\_\_\_\_

-When using the verb “gustar”, only two conjugation forms are used-  
“ \_\_\_\_\_ ” and “ \_\_\_\_\_ ”.

-An \_\_\_\_\_ will come before “gustar” to tell who likes something.

If what you like is <u>singular</u> or <u>a verb</u> (it is pleasing to...)		If what you like is <u>plural</u> (they are pleasing to...)	

**Ejemplo:** You like the book. Te gusta el libro.

**¡Inténtalo!** We like to walk. \_\_\_\_\_

I like the pens. \_\_\_\_\_

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-To emphasize/specify to whom the indirect object pronoun is referring, add

\_\_\_\_\_ + \_\_\_\_\_ before the IOP.

**Ejemplo:** You like the book.

A ti te gusta el libro.

**¡Inténtalo!** We like to walk.

-To make a sentence negative, place \_\_\_\_\_ **immediately** before the IOP.

**Ejemplo:** You don't like the book. A ti no te gusta el libro.

**¡Inténtalo!** We don't like to walk.

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## El verbo “gustar”

-To say that you like something in Spanish, use the verb **gustar**. However, the literal translation of gustar is “**to be pleasing**”, **NOT** “to like”.

### MODELO:

How we would say it: I like pizza.

How it literally translates: Pizza is pleasing to me.

-When using the verb “gustar”, only two conjugation forms are used- “**gusta**” and “**gustan**”.

-An **indirect object pronoun** will come before “gustar” to tell who likes something.

If what you like is <b>singular</b> or <b>a verb</b> (it is pleasing to...)		If what you like is <b>plural</b> (they are pleasing to...)	
Me gusta	Nos gusta	Me gustan	Nos gustan
Te gusta	Os gusta	Te gustan	Os gustan
Le gusta	Les gusta	Le gustan	Les gustan

**Ejemplo:** You like the book. Te gusta el libro.

**¡Inténtalo!** We like to walk. Nos gusta caminar.

I like the pens. Me gustan las plumas.

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-To emphasize/specify to whom the indirect object pronoun is referring, add **a + name/noun/pronoun** before the IOP.

A **mí** me

A **nosotros** nos

A **ti** te

A **vosotros** os

A **él/ella/Usted** le

A **ellos/ellas/Ustedes** les

**Ejemplo:** You like the book.

A **ti** te gusta el libro.

**¡Inténtalo!** We like to walk.

A **nosotros** nos gusta caminar.

I like the pens.

A **mí** me gustan las plumas.

-To make a sentence negative, place **no** **immediately** before the IOP.

**Ejemplo:** You don't like the book.      A **ti** **no** te gusta el libro.

**¡Inténtalo!** We don't like to walk.      A **nosotros** **no** nos gusta caminar.

I don't like the pens.      A **mí** **no** me gustan las plumas.
